

A passion from within

By the end of a year long program I hear feedback from teachers about the successes and challenges of starting or continuing to grow food, in their own homes, as well as how children have inspired and encouraged parents to grow food at home. This is the ultimate outcome, the end of my program for a year and the beginning of life long connections and skills out in the wider community. All of my books finish with the words "the end and the beginning...." and this is the ultimate outcome, to keep the life cycle of connecting to our environment and to real food circulating.

When a 4 year old can remember a year later what we planted, the colours of the plants and how they grow, as well as the season they grow in, chances are they will remember for the rest of their lives. The one to one conversations I have with 4-12 year olds while we get our hands dirty in the soil, tells me I am making an impact on their learning and their lives when it comes to connecting to the environment. This is reinforced by teachers and parents, which is what motivates me to keep on going and growing.

Greenhill Living plants the seed and students and teachers keep it growing with learning outcomes sometimes beyond my expectations. I absolutely love to hear about (and sometimes taste) the produce which has been harvested, prepared and shared from the garden, into the kitchen and on to the plates of the little people I work with. I love to hear how teachers build on the learning before my visits and after to ensure deeper connections to the learning.

It fills me with joy to hear of the observations being made between my visits and to have children run up to me on my arrival eager to share what has happened in the garden since I was there last.

Even gardens with large trees, lots of shade, which struggle to produce any significant volume of food have proven to have strong learning outcomes for the students. This proves it is the connection, not the physical outcome, of growing food which is most important. Our failures connect us to the challenges facing the people who grow our food (our farmers) as much as our successes!


Gaye the Garden Girl series
